INTER-RELATED: A COMMUNITY OF DIFFERENCE

One of the most beautiful - and sometimes most challenging - aspects of church life is that we don't all look the same, think the same, or live the same way. Yet week after week, here we are, worshipping together, serving the community together, and learning to love one another. The Church, at its best, is a community of difference - inter-related, not because we are the same, but because we are committed to one another.



Adam and I recently attended the Eastern Synod minister's Spring School. The theme, as you can see from the heading of this newsletter article, was **Inter-Related: A Community of Difference.** We were both encouraged, challenged and reminded of our interrelatedness and need for each other on our discipleship journey.

Paul uses the image of the body in 1 Corinthians 12 to describe the Church: many parts, one body. Each part is necessary, and no part can say to another, "I don't need you." That image still speaks powerfully today. It reminds us that our diversity—of age, background, politics, theology, and life experience—is not a weakness, but a strength.

I remember one Sunday after worship, a retired engineer with jacket and tie and a student, with dirty jeans and a T-shirt with dubious suggestions, sat in the hall sharing tea and talking about their lives. They had little in common on paper, but they found common ground in laughter and stories of resilience. That's what church can do—it creates the space where lives that wouldn't normally meet are held together by grace.

It's not always easy, of course. We may disagree, sometimes profoundly. We might not quite understand each other at first. We might come from different generations or backgrounds or hold different views on what worship should sound like, or how we express our faith in the world. Even our problems can appear miles apart. But these differences, if held with love and humility, can help us grow.

Being inter-related doesn't mean we have to all blend into one uniform way of being. It means we choose to listen, choose to honour each other's stories, and choose to stay at the table even when it's uncomfortable. Because we believe that in our diversity, God's fullness is revealed.

Friends, we are all working towards this ideal - where difference is not feared, but welcomed; where all are seen as part of the body; and where the Spirit knits us together, not in sameness, but in shared purpose and love. So next time you're in a church activity, take a moment to speak to someone you don't know well. Ask their story. Share a bit of yours. You might just discover how inter-related we already are, as we all are God's children.

CARING FOR GOD'S CREATION

At Castle Hill Church, we believe that caring for the environment is a vital part of our Christian witness. God calls us to be faithful stewards of His creation, and we are committed - both in word and action - to honouring that calling.

To guide our efforts, we are proud to be part of **A Rocha**, a global Christian conservation movement active in over 20 countries. (The name "A Rocha" means "The Rock" in Portuguese, where the first project began as a field study centre.) One of A Rocha's five core commitments is to follow Jesus Christ, who calls us to care deeply for the world He created.

In the UK, A Rocha supports churches through the **Eco Church** programme, which encourages practical environmental action. This includes caring for our buildings and grounds, engaging with our community, and reflecting creation care in our worship. Churches are awarded **Bronze, Silver, or Gold** status depending on their progress. Castle Hill currently holds the **Bronze Award** and is steadily working toward the more challenging **Silver Award**.

One of our biggest challenges is in the area of **Land and Nature** - but we're making progress! You may have noticed:

- Certain grassy areas are now being left to grow naturally
- Wildflower seeds have been planted
- Bird boxes, a bug hotel, and a hedgehog shelter have been installed

We've already taken part in the **Big Garden Birdwatch**, and starting this month we invite you to join us in the **Big Butterfly Count**—a fun and important way to contribute to wildlife monitoring.

We're also preparing to take part in **Target 25 (T25)**—an initiative aimed at helping 25 vulnerable species, habitats, and wildlife groups, either on our land or within the local community. For example, we'll be monitoring our own site to see whether our wildflower planting leads to an increase in bees and butterflies. As always, we aim to share what we're doing not just within our church family, but with the wider community. Through our actions, we hope to care not only for God's creation but also for the beauty and wellbeing of our local area.



DID YOU KNOW?

The dandelion, a common lawn 'weed', provides food for pollinators that is especially vital in early spring.

Dandelions get their name from the French name dent-de-lion. meaning 'lion's tooth' and have many colloquial names including 'pee-a-beds' with children being warned not to pick them because of the powerful diuretic effects of their roots. However, the whole of the plant is edible and nutritious for people and it has been cultivated throughout history for human consumption. The seed heads of dandelions have long been blown by children as a fun way of predicting the time...(blow) one o'clock...(blow) two o'clock...(blow) three o'clock!

WHY DO WILDFLOWERS NEED OUR HELP?

97% of the UK's wildflower meadows have been lost since the 1930s.

This decline in wildflower habitats has come about largely through changes in farming practices, land development and the processes of urbanisation.

Changes in trends in gardening have also greatly reduced the availability of wildflowers for pollinators, for example, use of herbicides, harsh mowing regimes and a switch to concrete, slabs and 'plastic grass'

WHERE ARE ALL THE BUTTERFLIES?

Following the results of the Big Butterfly Count 2024, Butterfly Conservation have declared a butterfly emergency, and we need your help more than ever before. By taking part in Butterfly Conservation's Big Butterfly Count - a UK wide survey, you can help assess the health of our environment simply by counting butterflies.

We at Castle Hill will be playing our part by counting the butterflies visiting our Church grounds. But each of us can take part by joining the count from our gardens. Between **Friday 18th July** and **Sunday 10th August** choose a place to spot butterflies and moths. Watch for **15 minutes**. Then record which species you see. You can count for just one day or as many days as you like.

For the smart phone users amongst you there is an app that you can download to record your count. And it doesn't need to be in the same place. You can record your finding while in the local park for example.

To find out more just enter 'Big Butterfly Count' in your browser. Or if its clear enough, scan the QR code on the chart. if you do not have a phone, computer or I-pad but would like to take part , speak to Len Green

FNKD AND UGANDA UPDATE



It feels like I've only just returned from Uganda, although it was Easter, time has gone by so quickly. My visit went very well and achieved so much during a short space of time. As well as the meetings, school visits, field visits and spending time at the Children's Centre we planned for and started to construct a well, which was completed just after I returned.

Although FNKD have completed many water projects in the past we hadn't built/dug a well before. Our FNKD team took me to an area of Bucence village (the same village as our Children's Centre) where they have never had access to clean water – they collected their water from a green pond. So, you can imagine their jubilation to receive the Gift of water – we rejoiced too that God used us in this way. Of course the well is already being used but I look forward to commissioning it with a small ceremony during my summer visit.

During my Easter visit, as well as my regular FNKD work, I was very involved in church work and was asked speak/preach at four services. The last was at a Church called Nyabiteete and although I wasn't the one to count them, but there had been 1004 people in the congregation plus 400 children – can you imagine? They would dearly love a Sunday School as the children sit in the service which are very lengthy. I did do a little gulp when I stood up to talk to so many but pretended there were just two people – one each side. But it was really quite wonderful to share a few words of God with so many.

I was pleased to bring back this letter of appreciation from the Diocesan Secretary on behalf of North Kigezi Diocese – they really appreciate and

value the work of FNKD and all it's supporters, sponsors and donations to help the needy people in this remote part of the world.

I'm travelling out to Uganda again on 17th July to continue with the work and starting to put plans in place. Please think of me, pray for me and maybe email me a message while I'm there as I appreciate your support.
